4-Session Workshops

	Time and Date	Description
The Art of Roman Warfare	Wednesdays at 10:15 am ET January 27-February 17	Romans perfected war like nobody else. Explore maniples, legions, the technology of warfare, the Roman Army camp, and major battles. When Athens was at its height, Rome was a still just a struggling village. Discover the tools and techniques it used to become master of the world.
Meet the Romans	Thursdays at 10:15 am ET January 28-February 18	Want a fast memorable overview of the Roman world? Topics will span art, culture, history and society. This workshop is intended for those who have a desire to get an overview of all things Roman. Perfect complement to the Latin language courses and for those taking the National Latin exam.
The Crucifixion Week	Wednesdays at 10:15 am ET February 24-March 17	We explore the day by day events in the final week before the crucifixion and look at the interplay between culture, religion, law, Roman and Jew. Find out how Jesus was clearly in charge every moment and knew exactly what he was doing. A fascinating study that will enrich your historical and spiritual understanding. Great tool for those in the ministry.
Feats of Roman Engineering	Thursdays at 10:15 am ET February 25-March 18	Thanks to the brilliant use of technology, the ancient Romans lived a very comfortable life-style. This workshop will cover the most amazing achievements in art, architecture and engineering ever conceived by Roman minds. Learn how the modern world has been made possible by ancient ingenuity.
Imperial Murder Mystery	Wednesdays at 10:15 am ET March 24-April 21	Join us for 150 years of palace intrigue, conspiracy, and even matricide! If you thought it might be cool to rule your own empire, this might change your mind. With daggers, poisoned mushrooms, and hidden peril around every corner, the halls of Rome's imperial palaces were not for the faint of heart. Enjoy the mystery and learn 150 years of Roman history in the process.
Introduction to Archaeology	Thursdays at 10:15 am ET March 25-April 22	This is one of our most popular workshops because our students get to see up-close how one leads life as an archaeologist. Methodology, special studies, cool finds... plus what does an archaeologist eat? Where does he live? How does one become an archaeologist? Class is very interactive with lots of Q&A time. Photos straight from the instructors excavations in Jordan, Greece and Turkey.

Latin 1b	Tuesdays-- Select one: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 9 am ET • 11:30 am ET • 4 pm ET 	In the second semester we cover chapters 10-19 in <i>Wheelock's Latin</i> . Topics include: Latin pronouns, the perfect system, third declension 1-stems, third declension adjectives, the passive voice of the present and perfect system.
Latin 2b	Tuesdays at 1 PM ET	In the final semester of Latin 2, we cover chapters 30-40 in <i>Wheelock's Latin</i> . Students master the more subtle grammatical constructions of the Latin language. Topics include the various uses of the subjunctive in clauses, volo, malo, nolo, fero, Fio, eo; supines, gerunds and gerundives.
Latin 3b/4b	Thursdays at 9 am ET	We will translate selections from Virgil's <i>Aeneid</i> . Students will be expected to submit approximately 60 lines of Latin assigned each week and should expect to take quizzes on vocabulary, grammar, syntax; plus literary forms, terms and context covered in our weekly sessions. Students will be assigned two 3-page papers. Latin selections are from the AP Vergil exam syllabus.
Greek 1b	Tuesdays at 10:15 am ET	Excellent mastery of Attic Greek will permit students to read a wide selection of Classical and <i>koine</i> authors. In this semester we cover chapters 9-16 of <i>Athenaze</i> Book 1.
Greek 2b	Tuesdays at 2:15 PM ET	Excellent mastery of Attic Greek will permit students to read a wide selection of Classical and <i>koine</i> authors. In this semester we cover chapters 24-30- of <i>Athenaze</i> Book 2.
Mythology in Classical Literature Beta	Thursdays at 11:30 am ET	In Mythology Beta we will focus a little more on Roman mythological literature with a reading of Virgil's <i>Aeneid</i> and Ovid's <i>Metamorphoses</i> . We will also cover the major heroes of Classical mythology: Heracles, Perseus, Theseus, Jason and the Argonauts.
Lukeion Roman History	Wednesdays at 11:30 am ET	We cover the major historical figures, archaeology, geography and politics of the early Romans through the time of Constantine. Students will gain an appreciation of the contributions of the ancient Romans to the modern world, especially in the social and political arenas. This is a highly visual course which will also serve to introduce students to Roman art, architecture and archaeology. Students will complete regular quizzes and write one 8-10 page research paper.

Greek and Latin Word Roots	Wednesdays at 1 pm ET	70% of modern English is directly descended from Greek, Latin or related languages. There are a lot of “word root” programs out there but most of them consist of several years of dry workbook assignments. This course will put a power boost in your vocabulary and help you prepare for college entrance exams all in once semester. We study the most commonly used building blocks of the English language in some unique and interesting ways. Plus, don’t forget story time in which we master words that stem from Classical historical and mythological sources!
Independent Study	Choose any 4 spring semester workshops	Custom design your own semester course: choose any 4 workshops this semester. Complete the workshop quiz and write a single 8-10 page paper on a topic that you and your advisor decide together.
6-week Seminar: College-Level Research Writing	Time: 1 PM on Thursdays •Jan. 28-Mar. 4 or •Mar. 11-22	What do college professors complain about the most? Students who haven't a clue about how to write a decent research paper! We will take you from the beginning and walk you through every step of a good research paper-- including how to use a college library to your best advantage. Learn what your professors hope for and expect from your papers. Learn what will impress your professor the most (hint: it is at the back of your paper). Learn the 10 things you must ALWAYS do in a research paper, and the 10 things you must never, ever do.
